## First Responders To Discuss AIDS

A workshop offered by Brunswick Community College is aimed at better informing emergency first responders about responsibilities and legal issues relating to the AIDS

The workshop, offered through the continuing education department, is free to all personnel likely to be the first responder in an emergency situation. These include volunteer rescue squad members, volunteer firefighters, local law enforcement officers and members of the Brunswick County Sheriff's Department.

The workshop will be offered at two locations from 6:30 p.m. to 9:30 p.m. It will be held in the West Brunswick High School cafeteria at Shallotte on Wednesday, March 23, then repeated on Thursday, March 24, in the cafeteria of South Brunswick High School at Boiling Spring Lakes.

The program will be presented by Peggy Bargenquast, health educator with the Brunswick County Health Department. It will consist of a lecture, a video presentation and a question and answer session. Topics covered will include laws regarding the AIDS virus, the responsibility for reporting AIDS, hospital and health department authority and responsibilities, and ways to reduce the risk of AIDS.

Along with Bargenquast, representatives from both The Brunswick Hospital and Dosher Memorial Hospital will be present.
