## **Eight County Students Place** In Regional Curriculum Fair

First place winners were Terry Nawara of Shallotte Middle School and Frank William of North Brunswick High School, both of whom entered computer projects. There is no state competition in the computer category.

Melissa Powell, a sixth grader at South Brunswick Middle School, will compete in the state science fair with her earth science project, "Evaporation." Saturday it received second place in the Earth Science division for grades 6-8.




Phil Burton, computer and science supervisor for the school system, coordinated those entries in the regional, while Liz Young was responsible for the math entries.








