Church Breaks Ground

Little River United Methodist Church broke ground Sunday, Feb. 12, on the first phase of its building expansion program, said church spokeswoman Mary Cobb of Calabash.

Taking part in the ceremony were the Rev. Franklin D. Hartsell, pastor; the Rev. Lemuel C. Carter, Marion District Superintendent of the United Methodist Church; and Mike Brazeal of Sunset Beach, chairman of the church's building committee. Symbolic shovelfuls of earth were also turned by building committee members.

Work was scheduled to begin this week on the 19-room education and office wing. Breckinridge Construction Co. of North Myrtle Beach, S.C., was awarded the \$322,000 contract for this first phase of the expansion project.

Phase II of the total \$850,000 project is slated to begin later this year.

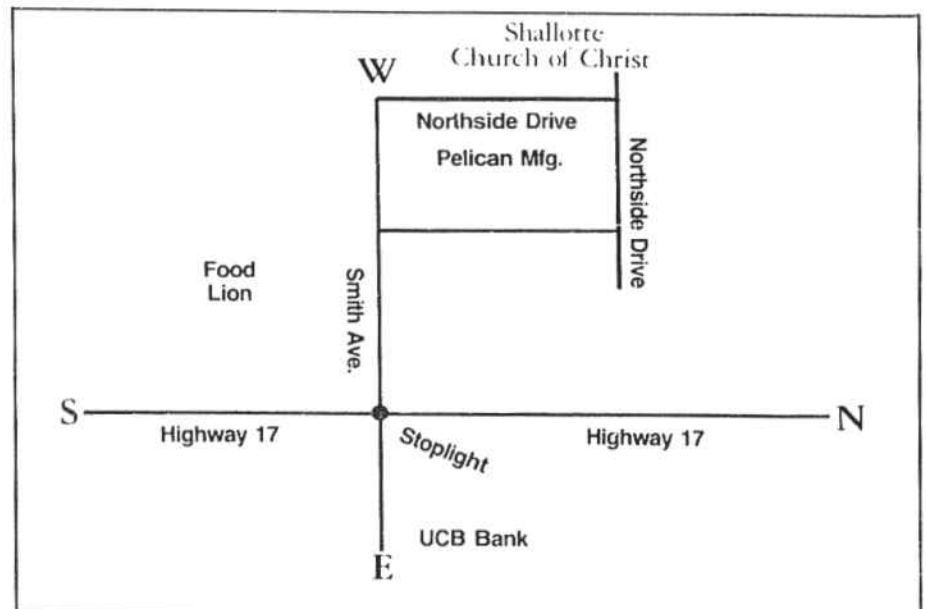
