**South Middle School 'Teams' Require Different Supplies**

Every student at South Brunswick Middle School is assigned to a team, according to Principal Bob Rhyme.

Supplies required for the upcoming school year vary from team to team, which he said parents should keep in mind when shopping to prepare students for the first day of school.

Sixth graders on the Bears team are asked to bring five individual composition notebooks, pencils, pens, and a folder with four pockets. Those on the Monarchs team are asked to bring four lightweight plastic three-ring, loose-leaf binders and pencils.

In the seventh grade, the Sand Dollars team should bring No. 2 pencils only, no pens, along with a spiral notebook for social studies, and loose-leaf notebooks and paper

for communications and math classes. Those on the Dolphins team should bring a three-ring poly binder, a book bag, two 3-subject spiral notebooks, a small spiral notebook, loose leaf paper, pencils and pens.

Eighth graders on the Shamrock team are asked to bring pencils, blue or black pens (no Eraser-mates), three-ring binders with five index tabs, notebook paper, two 3-subject composition books, three clear plastic theme folders, a yellow highlighter pen, compass, protractor, scientific graph paper, ruler, coloring markers, and an intermediate or collegiate level dictionary. Those on the Nugget team are to bring two large composition notebooks, loose-leaf paper, pencils, dividers and a ring binder.

Members of the Stars team will need a notebook for General Music, a notebook for Spanish, a loose-leaf binder for French, and a looseleaf binder and a \$1 lab fee for Careers.

Students in classes for the academically gifted (AG) will also need a three-ring notebook, notebook paper, notebook dividers, a three-subject composition book for

AG language arts only, pencils only (no pens), compass, protractor and scientific graph paper.

All students are expected to take physical education each day, with loose clothing and tennis shoes the preferred dress. Ample time is allowed for changing clothes, a news release from the school indicated.

**Brunswick Schools Won't Offer Day Care**

Brunswick County Schools won't be offering a before or after school day care program when classes resume next month.

School officials had begun discussing the possibility of the Wilmington YMCA offering a child care program similar to one now functioning in cooperation with the New Hanover County Schools.

However, Community Schools Coordinator Linden Mathews-Roone said that the Wilmington YMCA had decided it was in a position to begin offering program in Brunswick County.

And, she added, the school system itself isn't interested in starting last year's pilot program for three weeks.

A survey conducted by the school system administration indicated that most of the seven schools that participated in the January-May pilot program wanted to continue some form of supervised care for students before or after school, not picked up from school.

Ms. Mathews-Roone said that the school system's problems concerning day care are not as simple as providing a program for more than one child a day.

Last year between 130 and 150 children participated in the program.

Ms. Mathews-Roone said that it would be the school board's decision as to whether the school system will pursue. Some type of program may be offered later in the year, possibly in January.

"Whatever is offered will be a consistent program from school to school," she said, as board members had recommended earlier. Also, it will most likely be aimed at middle school students, avoiding competition with existing private after school programs offered for primary school students.

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
