Swelling, Shrinking Of Wood Related To Humidity Levels

Those lazy, hazy days of hot, humid summer weather have arrived. The moisture related to that humidity shows up in wood, whether in furniture, cabinets, house structure or outbuildings.

"Have you ever noticed in the summer how the crack in the dining room table disappears or a drawer in a chest becomes sticky, or an outside door of your house becomes hard to shut?" asked Milton Coleman, county extension director.

The swelling that wood undergoes during hot, humid days is natural. The moisture content in the wood always tends to reach an equilibrium with the surrounding humidity in the atmosphere, he said. When the humidity goes up, the wood tends to pick up the moisture and swell. When the humidity goes down, for example, in the winter in a heated home, the wood tends to lose moisture and shrink.

It would not be uncommon for the moisture content of the wood in our furniture and cabinets to go from a low in the winter of 4 percent to a high in the summer of 10 percent or more, Coleman says. A piece of solid oak or maple one foot wide across the grain may swell as much as one-eighth inch before the summer ends, then shrink back down in the winter, he said.

The swelling is a gradual thing; it doesn't happen overnight.

Coleman said that once lumber is cured in a kiln, the ending dimensions of the piece are not permanent; wood will still shrink and swell with changes in humidity.

He said property owners can minimize some moisture-related problems in wood and wood products by following these guidelines:

1) If building furniture or cabinets, use kiln-dried lumber. Air-dried lumber will generally not be dry enough for fine furniture in your home.

2) When refinishing an old piece, or finishing a new item, finish all surfaces with a good coating of paint, varnish or lacquer. This means the bottom side of a table, chair or dresser top. Good coating will reduce the rate of moisture pickup in the summer.

3) Design a wood product or structure to allow for the inevitable swelling that takes place during the summer. When installing a new wood floor, for example, leave plenty of space around the perimeter. When fitting a door, allow space for swelling.

4) Avoid high levels of moisture in the home in the summer. Soil-covers in the crawl space, air conditioning or humidifiers will help reduce moisture levels.
