Quick Dishes Use Leftover Turkey

Between Thanksgiving Day and New Year's Day most households have an abundant supply of turkey on hand.

Use yogurt instead of mayonnaise in the turkey salads to cut back on fat and calories.

TURKEY-FRUIT SALAD

- 2 C. diced cooked turkey or
- chicken
- 2 apples, diced
- 1 C. drained pineapple chunks
- 3 T. vanilla low-fat yogurt
- 3/4 tsp. curry powder
- 1/4 C. chopped nuts, optional

Toss all ingredients together and chill. Yields six servings and has approximately 170 calories per serving without nuts.
