## Plantings Provide Seasonal Decor

Area Extension Turfgrass Agent Running cedar, boxwood, holly, chestnuts and mistletoe are just a few of the plants that contribute to the sights and smells of the holiday season. I have always been interested in the botany of plants used for seasonal decoration. Many plants have long traditions coupled with an equally long myth.

Mistletoe (Phoradendron serotinum) is undoubtedly my favorite Christmas plant. The traditions following this plant certainly add to my Christmas cheer. Mistletoe plants can be either male or female. Female plants are the most attractive when covered with sticky white berries. These beautiful white berries are poisonous, so be careful when you use this plant for decoration. Mistletoe is a parasite on living hardwood trees and under the right conditions can cause serious injury to the host tree.

In my youth, I remember the

most beautiful wreaths were made from running cedar (Lycopodium clavatum) Running cedar is not cedar at all but a primitive plant related to the clubmosses. Due to overharvesting and loss of habitat, running

cedar is relatively rare in today's Christmas plant market. I understand some states have protected running cedar from harvest because of the plant's slow growth and relative rarity. Enjoy running cedar in nature rather than on your wreath.

Hundreds of varieties of holly have been developed but the most beautiful species for holiday decoration is the English holly (Ilex

aquifolium). Unfortunately the English holly is not easily cultivated in

the eastern part of North Carolina. Fortunately, horticulturists have hybridized the English holly to better adapted species to produce numerous varieties that grow beautifully in our area. The variety "Nellie Stevens" with its dark green leaves and red berries makes beautiful "boughs of holly" for holiday decoration. Several other varieties that make beautiful decorations include Foster holly No. 2, American holly and "Tinga" holly.

Boxwood (Buxus spp.) wreaths are beautiful and traditional in the holiday season of North Carolina. This is an excellent time of year to prune boxwood (an art in itself) and to make use of the prunings in wreaths, arrangements and other decorations. The fine texture, dark green color and smell of boxwood remind me of cozy gatherings and

I have never roasted chestnuts

(Castanea spp.) over an open fire but I do enjoy occasionally eating oven-roasted chestnut. Our native chestnut succumbed to the blight decades ago, but the blight resistant Chinese chestnut (Castanea mollissima) can be grown in its place. The Chinese chestnut is easy to grow but makes a spreading shrub or small tree that needs plenty of

A native miniature version of the Chinese chestnut is the chinquapin (Castanea pumila). My dad harvested his first crop of chinquapin chestnuts this fall. This species forms a large gangly shrub rather than a tree. The nuts are slightly smaller than acorns and are quite tasty. Commercially developed varieties should be planted since most seedlings will eventually succumb to the chestnut blight.


