Also Monday, board chairman Donna Baxter made several appointments. Board members Polly Russ and Yvonne Bright were named to a policy manual committee. Superintendent P.R. Hankins will appoint more members to that committee.

Waccamaw School Gets Grant

Waccamaw Elementary School has received a grant that will be used to boost parent involvement and allow the school to work better with its Spanish-speaking students.

The \$7,500 grant from the N.C. Department of Public Instruction will be used for a two-prong program which the school plans to imple ment in January, according to Assistant Principal Sybil Simmons.

One part of the program will be aimed at improving the school ability to work with Spanish-speaking students. Mrs. Simmons said Waccamaw is the smallest school in Brunswick County but has the largest percentage of Spanish-speaking students, most of whom come from families who work on farms.

The grant will be used to get a part-time staff member on campus who can speak Spanish with the families. The school also plans to offer Spanish class to school staff through Brunswick Community College, Mrs. Simmons said.

Also through the grant, the school hopes to improve parent involve-

ment by purchasing paperback books to send home with the students. Mrs. Simmons said instructions on how parents can use the books with their children also will be sent home. Parents will be invited to school to learn how they can use the books and help their children.

The assistant principal said 65 North Carolina public schools applied for the grants and eight were funded. She said she has applied for several grants at Waccamaw, but this was the first time she got one funded.

School Superintendent P.R. Hankins said he was glad she didn't give up after the unsuccessful attempts. "It didn't daunt her spirit at all, She plunged right in, and we applaud her effort.


