Cougars' Coach Hewett Pleased With Blue-White Game Results

South Brunswick head football coach Bill Hewett was overall pleased with the results of Saturday's annual Blue White scrimmage game at the Cougais' stadium

The game, which ended in a 35 35 tie, featured South Brunswick varsity and junior varsity players divided evenly among several offensive and defensive teams.

The Blue team led 22-0 at the half but the White rallied from a 35-20 deficit in the final quarter to gain

"The White team provided for a climatic ending under a real gametype atmosphere," said Hewett of the contest. "It's still hard to tell just where we are when we go up against ourselves.

The game was preceded by a special Picture Night for the players with parents getting a chance to get photos of the Cougars in game uni-

It was the second intersquad scrimmage for the Cougars who held a Junior-Senior contest last week under the lights with game officials and a running scoreboard clock to give South its first test under real conditions.

South Brunswick will face the first of two preseason opponents Friday when the Cougars battle Hoggard in the United Carolina Bank Jamboree in Wilmington.

South will also host Tabor City next Friday (Aug. 30) before opening its season on Septt. 6 entertaining county rival West Brunswick.

Hewett has been pretty pleased with the Cougars thus far in preseason drills.

"We will have a decent team. All the rain we've had is killing us in that we're not getting in the fundamental work we need.

"Practicing indoors is also keeping us from getting into the physical shape we need to be in," added Hewett, "Last year we didn't miss a single practice due to the weather. This year we've already missed four so far and August is very valuable time as far as preseason preparation

This year's Cougar team could be Hewett's smallest in his high school coaching career.

'We've got a total of 50-55 players on the varsity and junior varsity squads. I had hoped for possibly 75 players to report to practice. There is still a chance we can pick up a few more when school starts this week."

South Brunswick returns 12 starters along with seven defensive veterans and are expected to make plenty of waves in a highly-competitive Waccamaw 2-A Conference this fall.

Wide receiver Keith Marlow (5foot-11, 175, sr.) will likely be one of the standouts giving veteran quarterback Todd Vice a good pass-

Marlow has 4.65 speed and bench presses 315 pounds. He returned three punts for touchdowns last year and will be a scoring threat on both offense and special teams.

After the Cougars open the season against West Brunswick (nonconference matchup), they will visit Wallace-Rose Hill and entertain Acme-Delco.

South Brunswick opened WC play on Sept. 27 at East Bladen and then visits North Brunswick on Oct. 4.

The Cougars return home to meet West Columbus on Oct. 11 before taking to the road for the third time in four weeks to battle defending champion conference Robeson.

South Brunswick hosts Fairmont Oct. 25) and Whiteville (Nov. 1) in two consecutive home games before ending the regular season on Nov. 8 at West Brunswick in its second meeting with the Trojans, this time in a league contest.
