For consumers, the start of oyster season means an opportunity to buy and serve fresh, local oysters.

The late Bob King, a Brunswick County native and a biologist at Southeastern Community College, pulled together these tips for consumers buying oysters in the shell for the first time, or in general:

Buy from a reputable dealer.

 Avoid oysters with strong odor...they're spoiled.

 Buy only firmly closed oysters. Fresh oysters will not have a crack between the two shells.

·Make sure your oysters have not been stored in direct sunlight.

 And, for all consumers...good eating!
