JOBS Program Enrolls First Clients Hoping To Earn Pay

Six Brunswick County residents are trying to improve their education and jobs skills in an effort to get off federal welfare.

They are the first of 56 initial applicants for the Jobs Opportunities and Basic Skills Training Program (JOBS), which the Brunswick County Department of Social Services began in July.

JOBS is part of state legislation passed in 1988 that hopes to overhaul the federal welfare program by giving persons on Aid To Families With Dependent Children (AFDC) the right job training, education opportunities and day care needed to help them get paying jobs.

In Brunswick County, the lack of Estate of Maggie M. Evans public transportation often keeps people on welfare, said Ginger DeBerry, Brunswick County's JOBS coordinator.

> "It's always been a barrier here," said Ms. DeBerry.

The program must link DSS with area transportation and child care providers. DSS will either pay the providers directly or reimburse clients that participate in JOBS.

The six now participating are unemployed parents who were "mandatory volunteers," said DSS Director Jamie Orrock, Five groups of people are targeted by the state as potential clients for JOBS.

unemployed parents who have not completed high school, said Orrock. They often complain that the lack of child care keeps them from getting a job, he said.

"Hopefully, we can remove some of the barriers," said Orrock, "If they are excuses, we can find that out also by saying we can take care of it."

The first emphasis will be to have participants obtain a general equivalency diploma (GED) or high school diploma. Clients can attend Cape Fear Community College in Wilmington, Brunswick Community College in Supply or Southeastern Community College in Whiteville.

"We're not excluding any resources just because they lie outside of the county lines," said Orrock.

The program is funded through state and federal funds, with the county's share about \$38,000 annually, said Orrock.

Ms. DeBerry said she has been busy since July recruiting county resources that will participate in the JOBS program.

"We still have to have vendors who are willing to work with us," she said. "Rome wasn't built in a day, and this program will take a little time to get off the ground."

DSS hopes to have 215 people enrolled in JOBS by June 1992.

In other business Monday, the Brunswick County Department of Social Services Board voted to move the Nov. 25 meeting to Nov. 18, 5:30 p.m., in the conference room of the DSS building at the Most of the mandatory clients are government center in Bolivia.

Cost-Share Program Supports Farm Conservation Measures

Technicians at the Brunswick Soil and Water Conservation District office in Bolivia are taking requests from local farmers and other landowners for assistance with improving and converting their land.

The North Carolina Agriculture Cost-Share Program for Nonpoint Source Pollution Control is an assistance project, said Bill Norris, Cost-Share Program technician, designed to reduce sediments, nutrients, animal waste and pesticides from entering the state's streams, rivers and

Norris said that farmers are invited to call the district office and ask a technician to come out and inspect their property. If problems are reported, the district office reviews and approves an application request

that will be made for the landowner to the state office.

The program pays 75 percent of the average cost for each approved best management practices (BMPs). These are conservation measures taken to help farmers protect water

In Brunswick County, BMPs include conservation tillage, animal waste lagoons and waste application, cropland conversion, sodbased rotation water control structures, field borders, critical area treatment and drop-pipe structures.

Technical staff members are available to assist in developing conservation plans. Interested landowners can get more information from the district office at 919-253-

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
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
