The Gaffney, S.C., native only came to Shallotte in 1986, but made a lot of friends here in a short period of time

press box prior to a football game. That's what Fred Bradley meant to West Brunswick High School. It's not too often that you see a team like West Brunswick miss scoring

opportunities and squeak by lesser opponents like South Brunswick. That's what Fred Bradley meant to the football team.

Fred Bradley did a lot more than teach social studies and coach football. And he left behind a lot more than his mere footprints on the West Brunswick gridiron Fred left behind something much greater and more valuable in the

behind fond memories of a man who cared about people. On a more upbeat note, it looks like several of the young men who once competed on the county high school athletic fields are doing pretty

hearts and minds of the coaches and players with whom he worked. He left

well in the college ranks. Greg Williams, who starred on the gridiron and basketball court at South Brunswick, made the basketball team at the University of North

Carolina at Greensboro as a walk-on. Williams, a freshman at UNCG, averaged 17 points a game last year

for the conference basketball champs at South Brunswick. The former Cougar made the all-county and all-conference teams, and

was most valuable player on a high school squad that went 25-4 a year ago. As best we can tell, Williams is the first county cager since Chucky Brown to make a Division I team. Brown, who played his college ball at

N.C. State, went on to join the Cleveland Cavaliers of the NBA. Another former Cougar, Hans Bean, recently played a pretty good football game for the U.S. Merchant Marine Academy.

Bean, who graduated from South Brunswick High in 1989, caught seven passes for 87 yards as the Mariners tied Iona College 28-28 a few weeks

Named To Shrine Bowl Jimmy Grissett, a receiver and defensive back on the West Brunswick High School football team, has been third from Brunswick County.

The local senior is one of 35 high school football players and six ends in North Carolina to make the allstar team, which was announced Monday.

Marcus Jones, a tackle from Southwest Onslow, and Terrance Dixon, a multi-position player from Conway, S.C., were the only other players from southeastern North Carolina or northeastern South Carolina selected.

Grissett caught 19 passes for 532 yards and six touchdowns in the regular season, including three touchdowns in Sept. 6 game at South Brunswick.

In West Brunswick's playoff opener last Friday against Farmville Central, Grissett had three recep-

tions for 96 yards He helped break the game open in the second quarter when he caught a short pass from quarterback Brian Alderson, broke two tackles and sprinted 72 yards for a touchdown.

West Brunswick Coach Marshall Seav said Grissett was "pretty unknown" until this season, because he didn't start playing until his sophomore year and the Trojans didn't thrown the ball much last season.

"He certainly has an opportunity to brighten his football future by playing in the Shrine Bowl," Seay "He will represent the area very well."

Grissett, a 6-foot-1-inch, 180-

pounder, is only the second player in West Brunswick school history to be chosen for the Shrine Bowl and the

Former Trojan Jeff Bernard was named to the team in 1989 as a defensive back, and former South Brunswick stand-out Quentin Mc-Cracken made the squad in 1987.

Grissett has said he would play in the state championship game instead of the Shrine Bowl if the Trojans make it that far.
