Youth Can Learn From Fallen Sports Heroes

The more I get involved in covering sports, the more worried I become about kids and their tendency to look at pro athletes as heroes.

It's been going on for generations. Children who dream of playing pro baseball or football usually have one

or more players they really admire. I know I had heroes when I was a young boy with aspirations of becoming a second baseman in the big leagues.

Among them were Pete Rose, the driving force behind Cincinnati's Big Red Machine of the 1970s who later helped bring a World Series champi-

up to. He wasn't the most gifted athlete on the field. In fact, he was rather average when it came to ability.

But Pete made up for his lack of talent by having a greater desire to win than anyone else. He gave 100 percent every time he stepped up to bat or played the field. In that respect, he was a great role model for kids.

Unfortunately, Pete picked up a bad habit of gambling. He was banned from baseball and removed from the list of candidates eligible for election to the hall of fame.

Pete Rose's case isn't isolated. Youngsters of today have had a lot of opportunity recently to see what can happen to sports legends.

Two athletes who became legitimate heroes in the 1980s have seen their

lives turned inside-out in the last five months. Two of the most recognizable and admired athletes-Magic Johnson and Mike Tyson-have each been knocked down a few pegs. They've each

become victims of their own fame. Let's start with Magic Johnson, who retired from pro basketball last year after testing positive for the virus that causes AIDS. Johnson's flashy, glitzy style on the basketball floor has been emulated

on playgrounds around the country.

You could probably count on one hand the number of high school guards who haven't dreamed of running the floor and passing the ball like

Unfortunately, Magic's style on the court carried over into his personal

life. The smiling Lakers' superstar succumbed to the trappings of Hollywood.

He was living life in the fast lane, so to speak, and it eventually caught up with him.

You could say the same thing for Mike Tyson, who became the youngest heavyweight boxing champ in history. He may have seen his last pro bout. The man who had the opportunity to replace Muhammad Ali as the greatest boxer ever, blew it. He's facing a jail term for rape.

My point is that people should never become so caught up in their own fame and fortune that they forget they're only human.

Magic and Mike are subject to the same viruses and laws as any other man or woman on the street. They apparently let their sense of invincibility get the best of them.

Admiring the positive characteristics and qualities of sports stars is fine. There's nothing wrong with admiring Pete Rose's hustle or Magic Johnson's smile or Mike Tyson's determination.

But we probably shouldn't elevate pro athletes, or anyone else for that matter, to the role of hero. Human beings, by their very nature, will always fall short of our grand expectations.

the equation. That's right, the crew of the Early Bird made a run to the "Georgetown Hole" Sunday, March 7 in search of tuna, dolphin and wahoo. Little did they know that ole long nose would be in the area.

CAPTAIN JAMIE'S **OFFSHORE** The first marlin they hooked up with was success-FISHING fully brought along boatside and tagged for release. The REPORT second blue successfully released himself after an hour

in the fight. The Early Bird fishes out of Murrell's Inlet, S. C. The "Georgetown Hole" is located on the 100-fathom curve at loran reading 45139.0/59970.0. This is a heading of 188 degrees and 75 miles from Little River Inlet. There is little doubt that this is one of the best fishing grounds on the entire East

Several local boats enjoyed successful fishing trips over the past few weeks. The king mackerel have now moved into the 38-mile range. The water temperature has raised to 68 degrees in those areas. Captain Dan McRainey, fishing the Ocean Ale, caught several dolphin recently in this area. Bottom fishing for grouper, snapper and black bass has continued to be

I believe that if the weather holds we should start seeing kings in the 18 to 24-mile areas as early as April 1. It is time to start planning your spring trips to the coast and, with good weather and a little fishing luck, you should have no problem in locating the fish. Notice I said locating the fish-getting them in the boat is always another story.

Article Traces Commercial Fishing's Past In The State

An entertaining and informative article that traces the development of commercial fishing in North Carolina is featured in the January issue of North Carolina Historical Review.

In "Seiners and Tongers: North Carolina Fisheries in the Old and New South," Mark Taylor traces fishing from localized fisheries of the antebellum period to a diversified industry that flourished after the Civil War.

Taylor points out in the article that "only Gloucester, Massachusetts, surpassed Morehead City as the leading fishing port on the East Coast by the end of the nineteenth

The article includes an account of the bitter struggle between anglers who used the large haul seine nets and those who fished with smaller pound nets, according to an N.C. Department of Cultural Resources news release. Also of interest are descriptions

of mullet camps on the Outer Banks, the establishment of a menhaden fishery near Beaufort and development of an oyster industry in Carteret County and on Pamlico Sound during the late 1800s.
