Organizers of the Save Our Sounds Coastal Celebration hope it adds up to another weekend of learning and fun.

The fourth annual celebration will be held Saturday and Sunday, April 11 and 12, at the Kerr Scott Building on the N.C. State Fairgrounds in Raleigh. The event lasts from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. each day.
