From there it follows Turnpike Road (S.R. 1115) to Stone Chimney Road (S.R. 1115) to N.C. 211 toward Southport and the Southport-Fort Fisher Ferry.

An 11-mile segment along N.C. 211 is the only "hazardous area" noted on the map. The problem: seasonally high traffic volumes.

Heavy traffic can also be a problem occasionally on other parts of the route, but travel is generally safer and traffic lighter than on main thoroughfares such as U.S. 17.

Because of vagaries in funding, state biking maps bearing the new numerical designations aren't out yet. Existing maps still designate the routes by name; matching the names and numbers isn't difficult.

The "bicycling highways" are marked routes along existing primary and secondary roads, with route maps and supporting information on lodging and other services along the way, hazards and scenic or historic points of interest. They are popular with bicyclists of all types—individuals, family groups and touring groups.

None of the bicycling routes have special lanes for bicycles so cyclists must share the road with cars and trucks. However, the routes mapped are suggested as more suitable than others for use by bicyclists as connecting routes.

Maupin, a landscape gardener on spring vacation, fits the profile of an "average" bicyclist touring North Carolina in many ways.

Mary Paul Meletiou, assistant coordinator of the N.C. Department of Transportation Bicycle Program, describes the typical cyclist as having an average age of 36, "pretty well established" in a profession or career and with a good income.

On the road this cyclist spends as much money on food and lodging as tourists traveling by automobile, but doesn't bring home as many me-

mentos or "doodads", though they may choose to ship items they particularly want.

"They typically travel pretty light," she said. "Sometimes only with a credit card, a toothbrush and a change of clothing."
