"I remember when we thought somebody was smart if they could count from one to 100 without messing up," he said, drawing chuckles from a crowd that overflowed the muggy gymnasium.

Classmates cheered from chairs on the basketball floor when Housand recalled the institution of comput-

erized report cards that didn't require parent signatures. 'No matter how far we drift apart, we'll always be together," said Housand, who graduated with a 4.0 grade point average. "It's time for us to fly on our own."

## **BCC Sees Enrollment Increase**

Enrollment at Brunswick Community College continues to climb.

Beth McLean, dean of student services, said 383 students have enrolled for summer quarter classes, compared to 267 students in summer

The increase of 116 students represents a gain of 43 percent from the previous summer quarter.

As many as 24 students are enrolled in some classes, which is high for summer school, she said.

"It's the same story you hear every quarter-general ed(ucation) just keeps increasing," she said, referring to a program that allows students to earn dual transcripts from BCC and the University of North Carolina at Wilmington by taking specific curriculum courses at BCC. "It's the bargain prices. They can come here and take UNC-W courses for less."

General economic conditions have also played a role in increased enrollment throughout the year, as workers seek retraining for job advancement or to prepare for alternate employment.

Contributing to summer quarter enrollment are students registered for year-long courses such as nursing, cosmetology, heating and air conditioning, she said.

Those year-long program stu-

dents, who account for approximately 40 percent will have completed their studies when summer quarter ends Aug. 18.

BCC's commencement program will be held Aug. 21 at Hatch Auditorium on the camps of the N.C. Baptist Assembly on Oak Island.

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
