More than 400 people ate breakfast at the restaurant, including local cancer victim Chris Caudill and her husband and two sons, said spokesperson Marlene Varnam.



# Call On Experts To Identify Pests

Dear Plant Doctor: I lost some dogwoods, a flowering cherry and a Chinese chestnut tree from what appears to be the same insect problem. In the spring these trees failed to leaf out. On the trunk and limbs I noticed a fine chimney of sawdust that protruded .75 to 1.0 inches and was about the diameter of a pencil lead.

I suspect it is some type of borer. How do I prevent it from getting any of my other trees?

Answer: I do not have any idea which insect is damaging your trees, but I do know who to ask.

Some experts believe that more than 1 million different species of insect exist on earth and I think over half of them must inhabit southeastern North Carolina. I go to specialists when confronted with an unknown pest or disease problem.

The Plant Disease and Insect Clinic at North Carolina State University was established to identify plant diseases and insects of economic importance. The clinic's director, Ron Jones, Ph.D., uses the expertise of N.C. State University's pathologists, entomologists, virologists, bacteriologists and other research specialists to identify the problem and help prescribe a solution.

Brunswick counties five insect species were identified that had never before been seen in the state. I am sure this year we will see an equal number of new insect species.

Contact your county extension agent when you find an insect or disease problem that is causing damage to your vegetables, fruit trees, ornamentals or turf.

Most (90 percent) disease and insect problems can be quickly and easily identified and a control recommended. Take a sample of the damage the pest causes and the pest to your county agent. If the problem cannot be easily identified, request that the agent send the specimen/sample to the Plant Disease and Insect Clinic.

The clinic often acts as an early warning system of severe new pest

problems that have migrated into the state. Just this week a professional turf grass manager had me send a cricket that was destroying large areas of turf grass. The cricket did not look like anything I had ever seen before.

The clinic's entomologist reported the cricket to be a new cricket species for North Carolina. Specialists are planning a visit in the near future to see and evaluate the pest firsthand.

Dear Plant Doctor: I love crab apple trees but I have not had any luck at all with the one I planted several years ago. Please recommend some varieties that will tolerate the conditions in our area.

Answer: A number of pest problems and diseases destroy crab apple

trees in the hot, humid South. New varieties are being introduced that are resistant to many of the pest and disease problems in the area.

Fire blight is an especially damaging disease on crab apples. You may want to try *Adirondack*, *Baskatong*, *Prairiefire*, *Robinson*, or *White Cascade*. All of these varieties are resistant to fire blight damage. I am sending you *Superior Crabapple Trees for the Landscape*, Horticulture Information Leaflet No. 613, by Thomas Ranney, Ph.D. It lists the varieties that do best in North Carolina.


