"THOU SHALT NOT KILL"

"Please observe the law and avoid arrest," is the appeal made by Mayor E. L. Reed, who announces on the front page of The Perquimans Weekly that the Police Department of Hertford is making a special effort to enforce the traffic laws.

This is good news. The traffic laws should be more strictly enforced. Too many persons habitually disregard the regulations and endanger the lives of themselves and others.

Particularly do they drive too fast. Instead of the twenty-mile rate allowed by law, too many motorists drive on Hertford's streets at twice this rate.

There were 36,000 persons killed in this country last year in automobile accidents, and nearly a million were injured. North Carolina's contribution to this appalling record was shocking. There were 337,000 pedestrians struck by cars in this country last year, 16,000 of whom died as a result. There were 381,000 accidents in which two cars collided, resulting in the deaths of 8,500 persons, to say nothing of instances when serious injuries resulted but not deaths. Four thousand were killed as a result of cars striking fixed objects, and 1,100 perished in accidents involving cars and trains, a type of accident which is almost invariably the fault of the motorist, and generally due to excessive speed.

Drivers who speed in improper places—and any town or city street is an improper place for speeding, those who drive on the wrong side of the road, who pass on curves, who fail to give proper signals, and who are otherwise reckless, menace the life, health and property of others.

Excessive speed is said to be mainly responsible for the ghastly record made last year. Not only does excessive speed cause the bulk of the accidents, but it also tends to make the consequences of such accidents more serious.

Somebody has wisely said "The heavy foot on the accelerator is the best friend the Dark Angel has." Mayor Reed does well to give specific warning to speeders.

ATTEND B. T. U. MEET

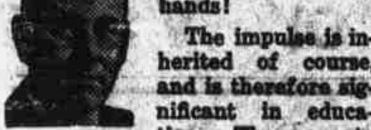

DOOR CHILD AND THE SCHOOL

Schools located in the snow and ice regions of the country are fortunate. Materials for building and sculpturing piled up at the door, and how young children like to work out ideas with their hands!



The impulse is inherited of course, and is therefore significant in education. The urge to create something is powerful. From such little beginnings come bridge builders and sculptors. We should recognize in this desire to construct, our opportunities for bringing out the artistic, for encouraging children to work out their thoughts, and to strive for the best result. It is a case where the imagination can end in actual accomplishment.

For the older children, there is no better health-building exercise than good outdoor ice skating, snow-shoeing, skiing, and tobogganing. These are social occasions too, when the whole group feels the spirit of fun. How well many of us can remember! But there is more to this educational opportunity. Remember the wet clothes and cold feet? Remember the appetite—how good a glass of warm milk tasted, and how well we slept? I'm trying to point out a duty to both teacher and parent.

Encourage these sports, not alone for the wonderful exercise and fun, but that you may teach a little more purposefully the correct diet for that appetite, the hours of sleep needed, the importance of changing into dry clothes, the prevention of frostbite, the pleasant sensation of a good bath and rub down, and how clean and interesting outdoor sports may be.

Dates Set For Civil Service Examinations

The United States Civil Service Commission has announced open competitive examinations as follows:
Assistant credit union investigator, \$2,600 a year, Farm Credit Administration.
Junior physicist, \$2,000 a year. Optional subjects are: Electricity, heat, mechanics, and optics.
Chemist, and senior, associate, and assistant chemists, \$2,600 to \$4,600 a year.
Assistant keeper, \$1,320 a year, National Zoological Park, Washington, D. C.

All States except Utah, Iowa, Vermont, Virginia, Maryland, and the District of Columbia have received less than their quota of appointments in the apportioned departmental service in Washington, D. C. The positions of assistant credit union investigator and assistant keeper are not affected by the State apportionment law.

Full information may be obtained from the Secretary of the United States Civil Service Board of Examiners at the post office or customhouse in any city which has a post office of the first or second class, or from the United States Civil Service Commission, Washington, D. C.

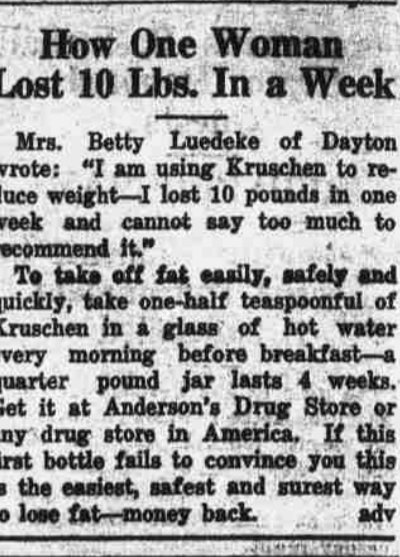
