Belvidere Academy Burned Thursday. (Continued From Page One) at some distance from the school, they thought it best to omit it for the present, provided Friends in the neighborhood would board this year at five dollars per month, which they agreed to do. A special building committee was later appointed to have the proposed additions made to the school building. In May, 1887, the teacher was called home by the death of his father, and the school was suspended for several months in consequence. And then a tragedy occurred in the peaceful little community. Johnathan E. Steere, of Rhode Island, came down to teach in the school, and after only a few weeks of work was drowned in the Perquimans River, at Eliab's Landing. John R. Winslow was employed for a few months thereafter. Christopher Wilson and his wife next took charge. This was in 1898. The Belvidere Academy was now a boarding school, and for a period of thirty years thereafter pupils who came from a distance were boarded at the school. It was shortly after the Civil War that it was decided to dispense with the boarders and maintain only a day school. There was no high school in all this section, and Belvidere Academy was an important institution for the entire Albemarle country. In 1899 the Quarterly Meeting conveyed the school and the property to Pines Woods Monthly Meeting of Friends, each year naming a committee of men and women, Friends, to have the care and management of the school. In 1898 this committee included Walter White, Emma H. White, Josiah Nicholson, Elizabeth W. Nicholson, Alice N. White, George T. Winslow, Charles H. White, Cora E. White, D. Winslow, Mary S. Winslow, Elizabeth E. White. Rufus

White, Treasurer of Pines Woods Monthly Meeting, was ex-officio Treasurer of the school funds. Josiah Nicholson was chairman and secretary.

The faculty at this time included Mary J. White and Adelaide E. White.
