



Belvidere Academy **Burned Thursday**

(Continued From Page One) at some distance from the school, they thought it best to omit it for the present, provided Friends in the neighborhood would board this year at five dollars per month, which they agreed to do.

A special building committee was later appointed to have the proposed additions made to the school building. In May, 1887, the teacher was called home by the death of his father, and the school was suspended for

several months in consequence. And then a tragedy occurred in the

neaceful little community. Johnathan E. Steere, of Rhode Island, came down to teach in the school, and after only a few weeks of work was drowned in the Perquimans River, at Eliab's

Landing. John R. Winslow was employed for

a few months thereafter. Christopher Wilson and his wife next took charge. This was in 1838. The Belvidere Academy was now boarding school, and for a period of thirty years thereafter pupils who came from a distance were board at the school. It was shortly after the Civil War that it was decided to dispense with the boarders and main-tain only a day school. There was no high school in all this section, and Belvidere Academy was

an important institution for the en-tire Albemarle country. In 1899 the Quarterly Meeting con-veyed the school and the
