

HELP STOP FOREST FIRES!

(At the time of the writing of this article the sun is obscured by a haze and the air is heavy with the smoke from forest fires raging and racing over the timbered lands of New Hanover and Brunswick Counties. As rain is badly needed conditions elsewhere in the pine-belt are no doubt similar or even worse than in this immediate section.)

I wonder how long we are going to view with indifference the run of the "red demon" through the beautiful and valuable woods and continue to condone the acts of careless and vicious men who have no appreciation of values and no regard for the rights of others.

At the 24th Annual Meeting of the North Carolina Forestry Association held in Raleigh in February last, the following resolutions were submitted by the resolutions committee, and approved and adopted by those members in attendance:

Resolutions
WHEREAS forests are the most important renewable natural resources of North Carolina, and

WHEREAS fire continues to be one of the greatest factors contributing to the destruction of existing forests and hindering or preventing the restocking of cut-over forests in the State, and

WHEREAS the efficiency of forest fire control organization maintained by the State Department of Conservation and Development in cooperation with the Federal Government, Lina Forestry Association herewith endorse the program now being undertaken by the State and Federal governments for the acquisition and development of State and Federal forests and parks for purposes of timber growing and demonstration in certain counties, and private owners

in the State has been very seriously impaired by the failure to provide adequate appropriations for the prevention and suppression of forest fires.

BE IT RESOLVED that the North Carolina Forestry Association very strongly urges the General Assembly to increase the budget for forest fire prevention and suppression from the \$12,020 recommended by the Budget Commission to \$59,040, the amount requested by the State Department of Conservation and Development. This amount will be required to meet federal, county, and other cooperative funds totaling \$180,000. These cooperative funds will be greatly reduced if the State Appropriations is materially lower than that requested by the Department.

Forest Fire Control Organization
RESOLVED that this Association endorse the plans recommended to this meeting by the Department of Conservation and Development for a State-wide Forest Fire Control Organization supported by State and Cooperative funds.

Federal and State Forests and Parks
WHEREAS, the establishment of Federal and State Forests and Parks is a fundamental step in the proper adjustment of permanent land use, therefore be it

RESOLVED that the North Carolina Forestry Association, for stream protection, recreation, wild life perpetuation, and the preservation of scenic and historic areas, and

RESOLVED, further, that timber grown on public forests should be harvested and manufactured, except in emergencies, through private agencies.

The North Carolina Forestry Association and the State Department of Conservation and Development needs the active support of a large number of good citizens in their efforts to awaken the masses and to make Mr. Average Citizen forestry conscious.

FHA Strengthens Morale, He Says

Bellrose, N. Y.—The morale of any prospective home owner should be greatly strengthened by the knowledge that his Government has confidence enough in his integrity to guarantee his unsupported personal obligation and make bank credit available to him, in the opinion of F. A. Rahter, Long Island real-estate developer.

The persons who become owners of one-family homes in the \$5,000 class represent a cross section of American middle-class life, Rahter believes, and will constitute the largest group to benefit under the mutual mortgage-insurance plan of the Federal Housing Administration.

These people, in the opinion of the real-estate man, will pay off their debts in full. He feels that they are not looking for "something for nothing" but, rather, are seeking financial aid "without mortgaging their souls and which will enable them to retain their self-respect."

Through a modernization loan Rahter's own home was recently re-decorated, he says, and added that the entire transaction which was conducted through a local approved lending agency, was pleasant and satisfactory.

Agricultural Workers Plan Summer Meetings

The full range of scientific facts, extension demonstration and national rural life movements will be presented and discussed at a series of meetings to be held over North Carolina this summer by State College and State Department of Agriculture workers.

Foremost among the meetings will be Farm and Home Week at State College, July 29 through August 2, at which farm men and women will gather to study late developments in agriculture and rural life. The week's program will emphasize "Conservation of Rural Resources."

The State 4-H club short course at the college, July 23-29, will bring boys and girls from over the State to enjoy a week of fun and fellowship while learning more about advanced phases of club work.

Farmers' field days at branch stations of the North Carolina Department of Agriculture will be held as follows: Blackland Station, Wenoona, July 18; Tobacco Station, Oxford, July 25; Upper Coastal Plain Station, Rocky Mount, August 8; Mountain Station, Swannanoa, August 15; Piedmont Station, Statesville, August 22; Coastal Plain Station, Willard, September 12.

Negro Meetings
For Negroes, there will be the annual state farmers' conference at A. & T. College, Greensboro, August 15-16, and the northeastern farmers' meeting at Bricks School, Edgecombe County, August 7-8. The 4-H short course for colored boys and girls will be at A. & T. College either the last week in August or the first week in September.

Four meetings for Negroes will also be held at branch station farms as follows: Tobacco Branch Station, July 26; Upper Coastal Plain Station, August 9; Piedmont Station, August 28; Coastal Plain Station, September 22.

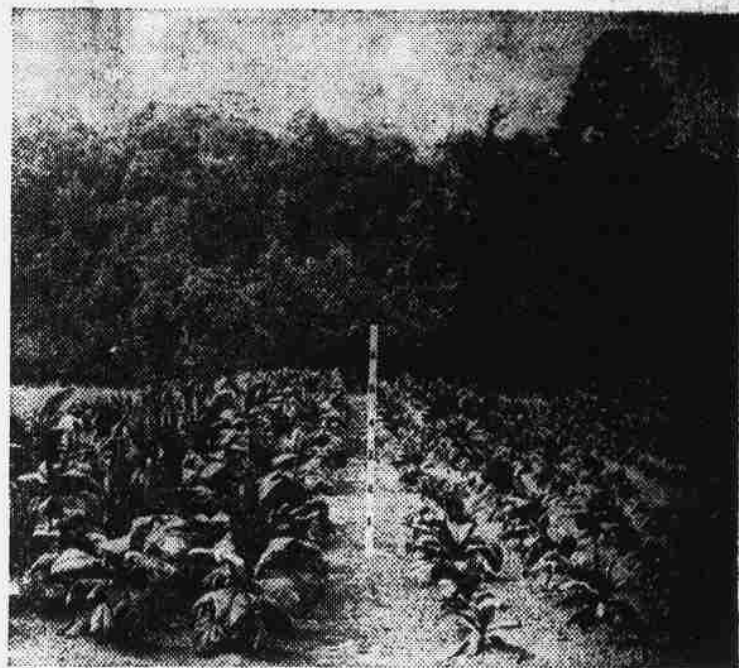

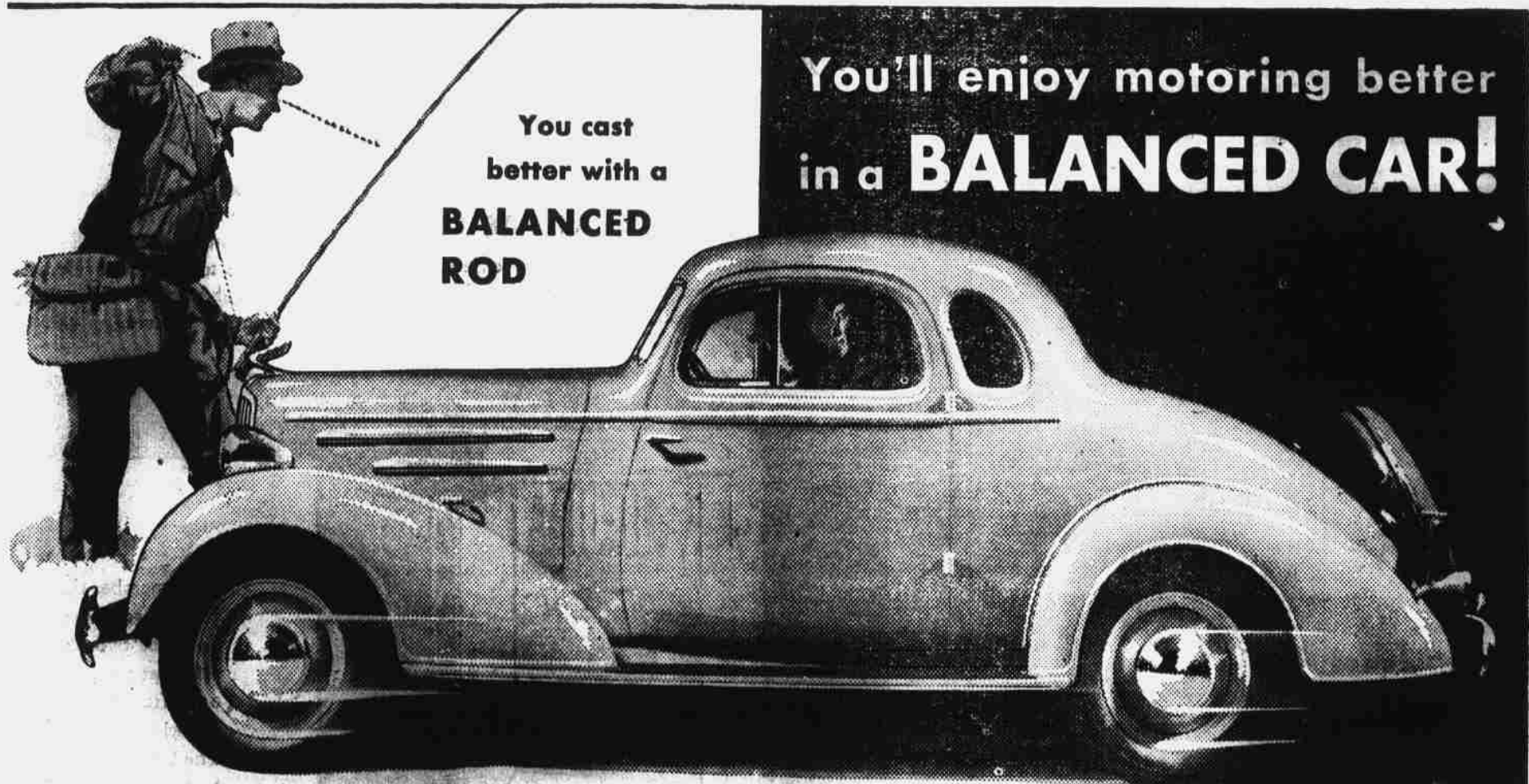
