J. S. Vick Lands Big Carp Under Bridge

A fish weighing 14 pounds and 6 ounces was caught with an ordinary hook and line in the Perquimans River, under the bridge, at Hertford, on Saturday.

The fish, a carp, was caught by J. S. Vick, keeper of the bridge, who says that he had previously broken several lines and lost a hook or two in an effort to land one of the big fish.

This particular specimen is not so big when it is considered that a carp sometimes attains the weight of 40 pounds, but so far as can be learned it is the largest fish ever caught in these waters with a hook and line.

An eight-pound black fish was caught by Enoch Brickhouse some years ago with a hook and line, and now then a black bass is caught weighing around 7 pounds. Most of the very large bass caught are caught by fishermen using reel and rod.

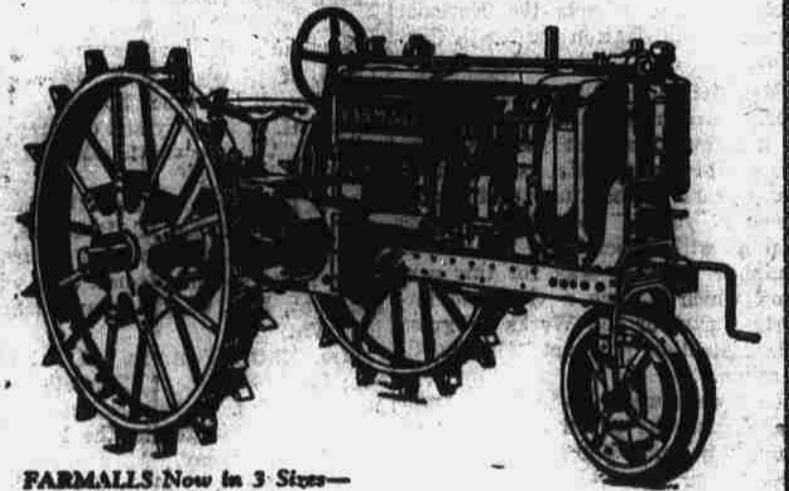
