The primary objective of the fall and winter garden contest, sponsored by the extension service, is to stimulate the growing of more vegetables during this period of the year.

The contest is open to any home garden grown by a rural family in North Carolina. Details about the contest and the prizes may be obtained from county farm or home de-monstration agents, Miss Thomas

The following suggestions regarding fall and winter gardens have been recommended by H. R. Niswonger and E. B. Morrow, extension horticulturists at the college.

In eastern North Carolina most of the fall and winter vegetables should be planted in September. It is too late for the tender crops, but the hardier vegetables will produce a good yield if planted now.

Among the vegetables to start at this time are: Siberian and green curled Scotch kale, head lettuce, mustard, spinach, turnips, radishes, and

Cabbage and onion seed may b sown in outdoor beds the latter part of the month and transplanted in December, January, or February, de-pending upon local climatic condi-tions.

In western North Carolina the tender vegetables must be given time to mature before the first killing frost, which usually occurs around year's crop, the plantings yet to be made must be limited to the hardier vegetables which will withstand cold weather and heavy freezes.

#### Bees Need Careful Attention In Fall

The value of next year's honey crop is largely dependent upon the care and management given the bee colonies this fall.

If the colonies are carried through the fall and winter in good shape, they will be ready for heavy production in the spring, said Frank B. Meacham, entomologist at State Col-

Give all colonies a thorough examination in September, he urges beekeepers, and pay careful attention to the condition of the gueen, amount of honey, number of bees, and space for brood rearing and nec-

tar storage. Young queens are best, since they produce a large amount of brood in August, September, and part of October. Bees produced at this time are the ones which survive the winter.

Three-banded or leather Italian queens, which can be purchased for 50 cents each from reliable breeders, are most desirable, Meacham stated. Replace all queens over a year old, or black and failing queens.

A colony which does not contain the equivalent of two or three Hoffman frames full of brood on September 1 is hardly worth wintering by itself. Often such colonies are not able to survive the winter.

Weak colonies can be united with strong ones by placing them together with a sheet of newspaper between. By the time the bees eat holes through the paper, they will have become acquainted with one another

and will not fight. Golden rod, aster or iron weed, and heartease or smartweed in many sections of the State will yield a few pounds of honey in the fall. This may be added to the winter feed supply, placed on the market, or transferred to colonies whose food is short, Meacham pointed out.
