### AN EDITORIAL

It takes something more than the mere printing of town and community gossip on which to build newspaper prestige, and with which to inspire confidence on the part of the public.

The newspaper must have a policy; it must do things; it must have opinions and not be afraid to express them; it must lead in community betterments, and it must provide information on local, national and world events so its readers may form their opinions.

This matter of policy cannot be a thing that is evidenced only occasionally or at intervals. It must be continuous, week after week, year after year.

To acquire and retain prestige and to inspire confidence with its readers, the newspaper must respect the rights of its readers. It must deliver to the readers week after week those things for which they have paid a subscription price. When they are "short weighted" they will do just what they would do if treated the same way by any merchant—go elsewhere to do their buying. The newspaper that does not at all times respect the rights of its subscribers will not only lose in prestige and confidence, but it will lose subscriber customers.

All of the people may not always agree with the policy followed by the newspaper, but they will respect it for having a policy.

Politically the newspaper need not be partisan. It can be Democratic or Republican, Independent or neutral, but it cannot be neutral on community affairs and community projects.

To acquire and retain prestige and to inspire confidence with its readers, the newspaper must print regularly such things as the public demand and have a right to expect in the newspaper they buy.

Prestige and confidence are the greatest assets of any newspaper. Without these no newspaper can achieve anything like a maximum of success. Printing only the town and community gossip will not create prestige or inspire confidence.

Prue was put in during the last half of the third quarter and shot 26 goals during the time she played.

### AWARDED CORN CLUB PRIZES



A yield of 119 bushels of corn produced at a cost of \$29.65 on his club acre, has brought to John Reno of Haywood County, the State championship in 4-H corn club work and won for him a one-year scholarship to State College offered by the Barrett Company, announces L. R. Harrill, State club leader.

Young Reno is also district winner in the southeastern extension district and gets a free scholarship to the annual 4-H short course to be held at State College this summer in late July. He has also been awarded a gold medal offered by the Chilean Nitrate of Soda Educational Bureau for the State 4-H corn club champion.

Atlas Finch of Wilson County is district winner in the northeastern extension district by virtue of producing 105 bushels of corn on one

acre at a cost of \$31.40. Marvin Foyles, of Lenior County is district winner in the southeastern extension district by producing 60 bushels of corn on his club acre at a cost of \$19.18. Don Gregory of Wilkes County is district winner in the northwestern extension district by producing 103½ bushels at a cost of \$30.03.

Mr. Harrill says that each of these district winners has been given a free scholarship to the annual 4-H club short course by reason of funds donated by the Chilean Nitrate of Soda Educational Bureau. The winners were selected on the basis of their yields per acre, profits made, field selection of seed corn, selection and exhibition of samples from their corn and records submitted in reports checked by their county farm agents.
