S., whose topic will be "Let's Follow George Washington!" and Matthew Wall, vice president of the American Federation of Labor, who will talk on "America's Duty to Americans."

A member pledges to buy so far as is practical, only products made or grown in America, by American labor of American materials, and thereby protect jobs and give work to fellow Americans, and maintain the American standard of wages.

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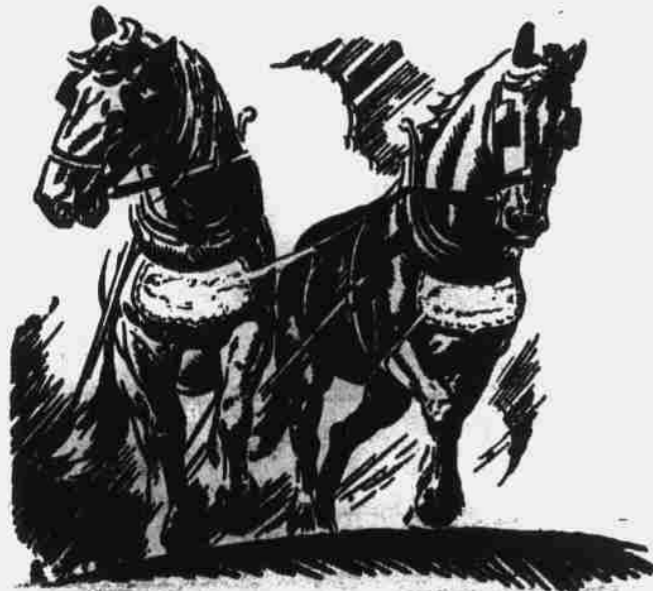
