Convict Converts Knife Into Dangerous Dagger

What had been an ordinary silver-plated case knife, before "Kid" Jones Williams, prisoner at the Woodville Prison Camp in Perquimans County, undertook to transform it into a dagger, turned out to be a pretty formidable weapon. It was found concealed on the person of Williams on Saturday.

There are 163 prisoners at the Woodville Prison Camp, most of them long termers, as this is a prison for felons; but Williams had been sent to the Dare County Prison Camp for only twelve months on a larceny charge. He was sent to the Woodville Camp for discipline, and for some months has been, along with the others at the camp, "under the gun."

Last week it came to Captain

Toler, through the prison grapevine, that "Kid" Williams probably had the knife which was missing from the employees' mess hall, and a search was made and the knife found. But what a transformation had been made! The blade of the knife had been ground to a stiletto-like point, on one side of which there had been filed saw-like teeth. Williams explained that he had made the knife for protection.

He will be tried for carrying a concealed weapon at next Tuesday's term of Perquimans County Recorder's Court and probably a good deal of extra time will be added to his term, which has almost expired.
