## Co-eds Taught Art of Correct Coffee Making



**Toledo University Students Instructed To Use Standard Measuring Utensils in Preparing Coffee**

THESE four young ladies, students of Toledo University, coffee pot, students are instructed to measure all ingredients with standard measuring utensils, thus insuring a uniform pot of good coffee each time.

Miss Lena Folger, instructor of the class, advocates the following recipe for correct coffee making. Two level tablespoons of coffee to a standard measuring cup of water. If boiled coffee is made, she suggests the same proportions for each cup, plus an extra tablespoon of coffee for the pot. She urges the use of standard measuring utensils to insure correct proportions for both water and coffee.

Coffee vacuum packed in glass containers is used in the laboratory class room because the coffee is found to stay fresher over a longer period of time. In addition to the use of coffee as a beverage, the students also test recipes in which coffee is used as an ingredient.
