



THE value of a garden plant, vegetable or flower, depends greatly upon the start it gets; so give your seedlings ample care. Begin cultivation as soon as rows are visible, if soll is not wet. Work close to the small plants, cultivat-ing shallower as they grow, to avoid injury to root growth. Cultivate often, at least once r week. Three days' delay almost soubles the work. Watering should not be neces-mary the first week or ten days after seeds hare sprouted. If ground is baked hard and sprouts do not appear, the surface may be disturbed slightly to help the uposts through.





