

Timely Questions on Farm Answered

Question: What is the cause of impacted and sour crops in poultry?
Answer: When this condition appears suddenly and a large number of birds are affected the cause is usually due to spoiled or poisonous feed. All vessels should be carefully cleaned and the feed examined to see that it is not spoiled or sour. If only one bird is affected, the condition is generally caused by a weakened condition of the muscles of the upper digestive tract. In the latter case the bird should be destroyed as there is no way to correct this fundamental weakness.

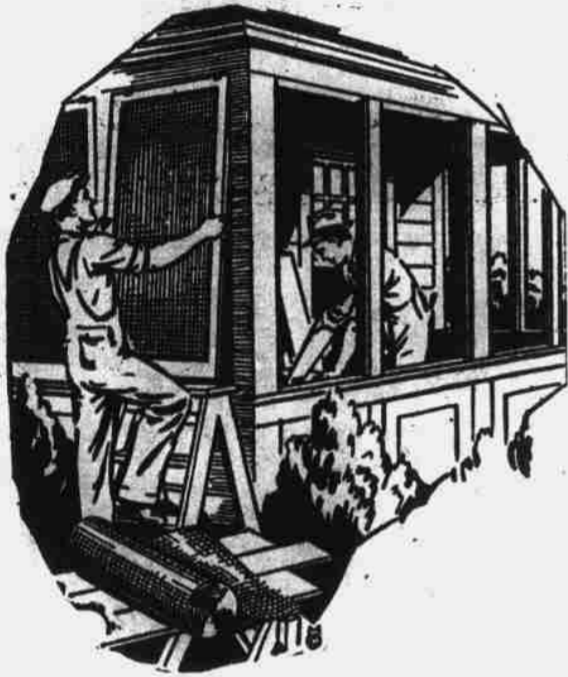
Question: Will a cash tenant receive all soil-conserving and soil-building payments?
Answer: A cash tenant, under the soil conservation program, is classified as the "owner" and as such will receive all the soil-conserving payments. The soil-building

payments are made to the owner with reference to the soil-building crops or practices. Any fixed commodity payment made as rent is also classified as a cash rental and the tenant paying rent is entitled to all benefits of soil-conserving payments.

Question: How much corn should I plant to provide silage for my dairy herd next winter?
Answer: This, of course, depends upon the productivity of the land and the number of mature animals in the herd. The average Jersey or Guernsey cow will consume from 30 to 35 pounds of silage a day and about three and one-half tons should be provided for the six months period. On an average corn will yield one ton of silage to each five bushels of grain and the necessary planting can be computed by getting the number of tons required for the herd and then multiply this by five. Divide the answer by the average corn yield on the farm for the number of acres that should be seeded for silage.

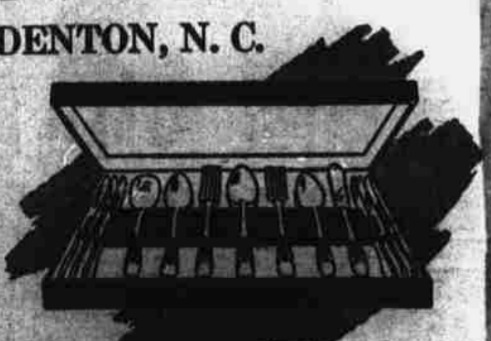
