### WONDER OF THE WORLD

RIGHT here on our own half of the globe are the ruins of an amazing fortress considered by some archeologists to outrank even the famous "seven wonders of the world." It is the Fortress of Saqsahuaman, situated on a hill, overlooking Cuzco, Peru, where in 1100 A. D. the "Children of the Sun" set up their capital city—a place which today is a mecca for archeologists from all over the world and the new objective of the regular 29-Day Cruises to the "Land of the Incas." Some authorities rate Saqsahuaman as the most perfectly planned fortress ever built. It is located on a headland overlooking Cuzco and is comprised of three gigantic walls arranged in tiers each laid out in a zigzag course with re-entering angles many of which are cornered with immense blocks of flint-like stone measuring about 25 feet high and 10 or 12 feet thick. The manner in which the wall was constructed remains one of the great mysteries of the world. No one knows how such immense blocks could have been carried from the quarry or how they could have been fitted together so closely. The Indians had no draught animals, no one has been able to discover that they had any machinery or any iron or steel implement of any kind. One colorful story advanced by the Indians is that the juice of a native plant was rubbed on the edges of the stones softening them so that they could be fitted together like pillows.
