Gates 4-H Clubs Profit On Corn Club Projects

Completed records by 4-H club members in Gates County show profits ranging from \$21.05 to \$41.40 per acre on the corn club projects, reports County Agent R. E. Rich. The highest yield of 74 bushels was made by Wesley Eare. This yield also returned the largest profit of \$41.40. Rowland G. Riddick secured 60 bushels from his acre with a net profit of \$31.35. The lowest yield of 46 and one-half bushels was made by Langley Eare, but his records show a profit of \$21.05 on the project, Rich says.

Interesting Facts About Railroads

The railroads had 1,104,448 employees in October, the greatest number since December, 1931.

The level of freight rates now charged by the railroads of the United States is 23 per cent below that in 1921.

Driving wheels of modern large steam locomotives have axles ranging from twelve to fourteen inches in diameter.

Fire losses on American railroads in 1933 totaled \$3,278,927, a reduction of nearly 55 per cent compared with ten years ago.

Passengers in Pullman cars traveled 7,146,269,648 miles in 1933, an average of 57 miles for every resident in the United States.

That high train speed does not seem to be an important factor in highway railroad crossing accidents is shown by the fact that nearly 81 per cent of such accidents in the first six months of 1933 occurred when trains either were standing still or moving at a speed of from one to nine miles per hour.

Livestock As Side Line Nets Farmer In Bertie County \$943

A. V. Cobb of the Bucklehorn township in Bertie County has sold a total of \$943.14 worth of livestock from his farm during the past year as a sideline to the production of cotton and peanuts, reports County Agent B. E. Grant. The livestock sales included 32 hogs that sold for \$894.84, 5 head of cattle for \$209.58, and 9 sheep that brought \$38.72. In addition to the livestock Mr. Cobb has sold three pairs of all wool blankets made from wool produced on the farm, says Grant.

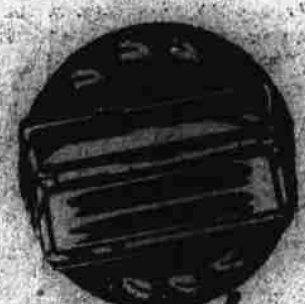
