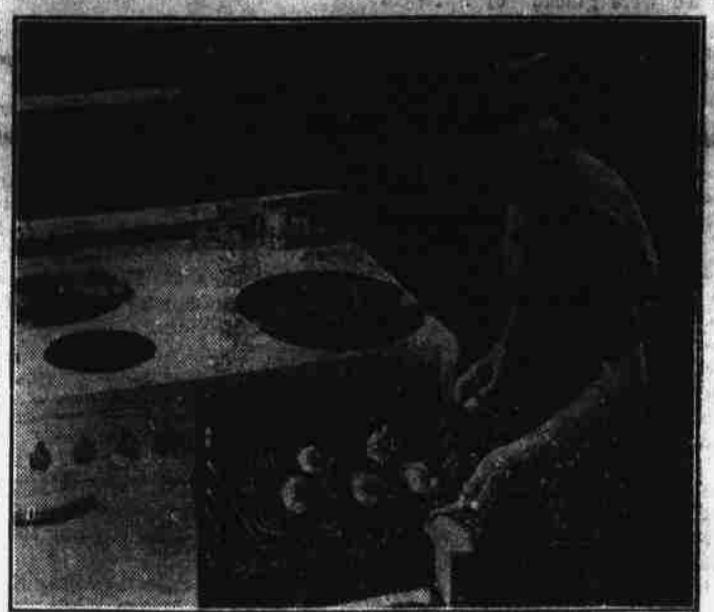

### Everyday Cooking Miracles

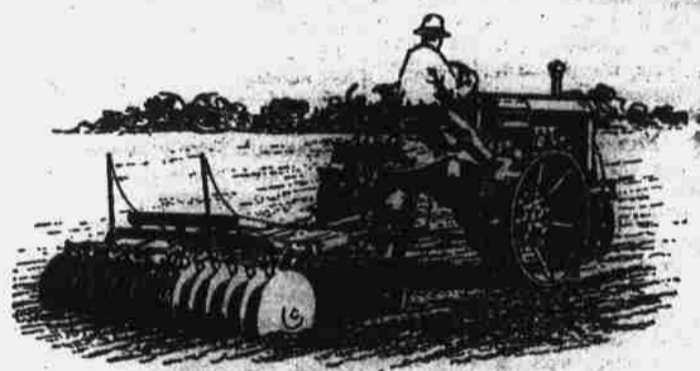

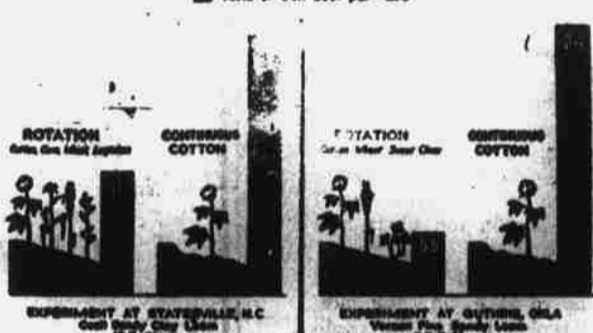

### ROTATION REDUCES SOIL LOSSES IN COTTON FIELDS

Tons of Soil Lost per Acre



Soil losses are more severe on land planted continuously to cotton alone than on land where the cotton is grown in rotation with other crops such as corn, wheat, lespedeza, and clover. The picture above shows how experiments have demonstrated the value of good rotations in checking erosion, said E. C. Blair, extension agronomist at State College. Sometimes rotations will reduce erosion by as much as 18 tons or more per acre each year.
