LOOKING TO COUNTY COMMISSIONERS

With announcements coming from various county seats that the county welfare boards have been appointed, nothing appears to have been done by the commissioners of Perquimans as to the appointment of the one member of this board which the commissioners are required to make.

The County Welfare Board, which is a provision of the Social Security Act, will have very important duties to perform. Its duties will be chiefly to act in an advisory capacity to the County Welfare Officer in conjunction with the Board of County Commissioners. They will have something to say as to who of the aged, and of the dependent children are to receive benefit payments under the Social Security Act, and how much shall be paid in each case.

This welfare board should be composed of the strongest citizens of the county, persons familiar with conditions in the county, who know the people of the county, who are interested in the welfare of the county and who are willing to give of their time for the public good.

Both Chowan and Pasquotank Counties have announced the complete personnel of their county welfare boards. Both of these counties are represented on their county welfare boards by high types of citizens.

The citizens of Perquimans will await with interest the announcement of the board of county commissioners as to their appointee.

IT WILL PAY

For every dollar that the county pays to dependent children and to old people under the provisions of the Social Security Act, which goes into effect on July 1, there will be paid in to the county three more. If the county pays an individual \$5.00, the state government matches that amount, and the federal government then steps in with an amount equaling the total, with the result that \$20 is paid to the individual, only five of which is furnished by the county. In no case will the federal government pay more than \$15 to an individual under this plan, which means that in no case can the county pay more than \$7.50, which would result in the individual receiving \$30.

These old age and dependent children benefit payments are going to be spent right here among us. The local business firms will get their share of the money thus put into circulation and the county will speedily get back its bread cast upon the waters. We will not merely be helping our unfortunate people when we allow them help under this plan, but we shall be helping ourselves.

Let us hope that this angle of the situation will be given due consideration when applications from the needy of our county come up for consideration.
