Miss Ruth Davenport, Superintendent of Public Welfare in Perquimans, and the members of the County Welfare Board, which is composed of Charles E. Johnson, W. F. C. Edwards and Mrs. V. N. Darden, took seriously the suggestion of the State Board of Charities and Public Welfare and gave their time and attention toward making up an estimate of the amount of tax it would be necessary to levy in Perquimans in order to raise the money necessary for carrying out the Social Security Program in Perquimans.

These four persons, who are quite capable of making such an estimate, recommended to the State Board that it would require a ten-cent levy to carry out the program in this county.

But it turns out that the recommendation of the folks who ought to know is disregarded, and when the budget fixed by the Division of Public Assistance of the Welfare Department at Raleigh was sent back to the county it was shown that it would require more than a fifteen-cent levy to take care of the expense in Perquimans.

The County Commissioners of Perquimans refused to accept the budget. Whether the commissioners can get away with this remains to be seen. Anyhow, it is refreshing to see that they have the spunk to attempt it.

SLOW BUT SURE

There is not a great deal of fanfare, no flourish of trumpets or ringing of bells; nobody is making a great deal of noise about the matter. In a word, there isn't overmuch enthusiasm evident in the membership campaign of the Hertford Council.

This is probably well. A slower growth probably indicates a better foundation, a more stable structure. We do not wish an organization which will die when the tumult and the shouting dies. Better not to have the tumult or the shouting.

However, slowly but surely the membership is growing. This in spite of the fact that it is mid-summer, a time when everything slows up, when people are going and coming, when it is difficult to assemble a group of persons for any occasion, when it is too hot to do more than we must.

And the organization will grow. It will thrive. Bear in mind that its objective is to make the Town of Hertford a better place in which to live.
