motion of the state with benefit of trial, be committed to the roads to begin serving the sentences.

Officer Walker testified that shortly after he was notified of the fight between Lane and Goodwin he was also informed that a jug of liquor had been carried from the Lane home to the home of W. M. Curtiss, who lives next door. A search warrant to search the Curtiss premises was procured and officer Walker and Town Constable Owens went to the Curtiss home and was shown two jugs of liquor by Mr. Curtiss, who informed the officers that one of the containers in which there was about 2 1-2 gallons, belonged to him and that the other container in which there was approximately the same amount was Lane's, and that Lane had brought it to his home the night before and asked him to keep it.

Mr. Curtiss was arrested and taken to jail, later securing bail, charged with possessing liquor for the purpose of sale. Lane was kept in jail until the trial.

The case against W. M. Curtiss, who was a witness for the state in the Lane trial, was continued until next Tuesday.

Information which the officers re-

cured from Lee Turnage, a stepson of Mr. Curtiss, led to the arrest of Lane on the charge of manufacturing liquor. He led the officers to a still described as a medium sized still, located on Skinner's Creek, three quarters of a mile from town, and told them he had worked for Lane, that he kept the fire and carried the water. The officers destroyed the still.

There was also testimony that Lane, who testified he had an in-

come of 30 dollars per month to take care of himself, his wife and two children; had recently purchased a 100-pound bag of sugar and a peck of meal from a local merchant.

There was a full docket on Tuesday, with only one colored man being tried. The courthouse was packed, with many standing at times, most of the spectators being white persons.

There was a wide range of offenses represented in the various cases, two being tried for using profanity on the highway and resisting an officer, one for failure to vaccinate a dog, two for being drunk and disorderly, several assault cases and the liquor case.

Fred Smith and Gertrude Dail Williams were found guilty of using profane language on a public highway and with resisting an officer; Watt Copeland plead guilty to being drunk and disorderly and was given a fine of ten dollars; Neal Blow was found not guilty of failure to vaccinate a dog after being notified; Alton Pearce, white, and Percy Shary, colored, were found guilty of assault. Prayer for judgment was continued against both defendants, upon the

payment of a fine of \$15.00 by Percy Shary and a fine of \$25.00 by Alton Pearce, and upon good behavior for two years. George Butler was found guilty of being drunk and disorderly and fined \$10.
