The exhibits of Perquimans products, arranged by Miss Gladys Hamrick, home demonstration agent, and L. W. Anderson, farm agent, came in for their share of interest, and that 21 different kinds of products were represented in the display of canned goods furnished by the home demonstration clubs of the county, was interesting even to the home folks.

The travelers, who were guests of the Governor's Hospitality Committee, and who were being shown the interesting points of the State of North Carolina as a part of the program to advertise the State, had visited practically the entire State before they made the stop in Hertford, having stopped at some 58 points of interest.

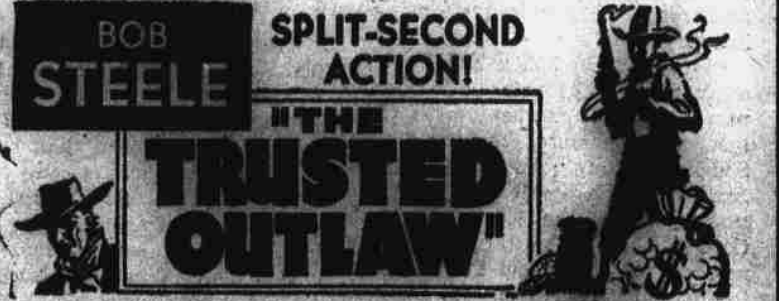
