

Four Men Will Spend Christmas On Roads As Result

Two young Perquinsans County white men and two Negroes will spend Christmas on the roads, sent up on Tuesday from Perquimans County's Recorder's Court, and a tion of using profune language on fifth may get out of the Perquimans public street.

Tim Thach, colored, was sent to jail in time to spend Christmas Day with his family in Maryland, though he still has sometime to serve on the 30-day sentence imposed—all resulting from drinking. In addition to this, there was a six-months suspended sentence imposed upon a man who best his wife while under the influence of liquor, and a couple of colored women were involved in li-

quor cases. As a matter of fact, of the nine cases tried in court on Tuesday by Judge Walter H. Oakey, Jr., eight involved liquor, the ninth being a traffic violation. Maxey D. Chappell plead guilty to driving with insufficient brakes and the case was dismissed upon payment of the costs.

The first case was that against Newman Sterling, of Chrissfield, Vd., who plead guilty of driving while under the influence of intoxicants. Hel was sentenced to 30 days in jail and Standin, Blanche Goodwin, Cornie his driver's license was revoked for a year.

Elmer Chalk, convicted of assault upon a female, was sentenced to six months on the roads, sentence being suspended upon the condition that the defendant not annoy the prosecuting witness, who is his wife, and that the defendant show good behavior for the period of two years, and upon the payment of the court costs. Nothing in the judgment shall be construed to prevent or prohibit the defendant from supporting his wife and family, and the judgment is subject to modification upon motion of both the defendant and the prosecuting witness.
