

All the resources of the United States Navy were loaned, it is said, to Warner Bros. for the production of a thrilling melodrama called "Submarine D-1," which opens today at the State Theatre and is announced as the most stirring and authentic film ever made with a "tin fish"-as the gobs irreverently term an undersea boat-as its subject.
