TWO APPOINTMENTS

Sticking to his official family, Governor Hoy has appointed to the vacancy on the State Supreme Court A. A. F. Seawell, the Attorney General who in that office and as Assistant Attorney General has been identified with the functioning of the court for seven years. As Attorney General he has named Harry McMullan, the Assistant Attorney General, who has been identified with the State Government for five years.

Mr. Seawell, at 73, is recognized as one of North Carolina's hardest workers and most careful legal minds. In him there's dignity and personal worth, and a keen aptitude for the legal problem. With him, Mr. McMullan has shared some taxing interpretative burdens.

In the joint selection Governor Hoy gives the State an assurance of continuity wholesome for the continuing confidence of the people in the Court and the State's legal establishment.—The News & Observer.
