For citrus fruit marmalade and crystallized grapefruit peel Miss Hamrick recommends the following procedure:

Citrus Fruit Marmalade

1 orange 1 grapefruit

Wash fruit and cut into thin slices with a very sharp knife. Sharpen knife frequently. This amount of 30 minutes. Stir frequently with a

wooden spoon during the cooking. Let stand over night in an enameled preserving kettle. Next morning boil 20 minutes and let stand until cool. Measure. (It should measure "The World Outlook." > Cook rapidly until the jelly stage is reached. Cool for two or three the fruit from rising to the top. Crystallized Grapefruit Peel
