He was a constitutional, unselfish statesman, and retired quietly as soon as his brief period ended. There was an-other title, "tyrant," for men who forced their way to control of the state and tried to remain in power, according to an authority in Pearson's London Weekly. Caesar was assassinated because his enemies said he was a tyrant, not a dictator. Dictators are true statesmen; tyrants are despots.
