**POULTRY OUTLOOK**

A larger hatch and increased market and storage supplies of poultry and eggs were cited by the U. S. Bureau of Agricultural Economics as among the important developments expected in the poultry and egg situation in 1939.

**Poultry And Eggs Prospects Given**

By early fall some indication of the prospects for poultry and eggs during the ensuing year are available. At the present time, important developments during 1939 are expected by the Bureau of Agricultural Economics to include: (1) A larger hatch than in 1938, resulting from the continued favorable feed and egg price situation; (2) larger poultry supplies throughout the coming year, because of the increase in the 1938 hatch and the further increase in 1939 (3) increased supplies of eggs, due to a larger number of pullets entering laying flocks and the favorable feed situation; (4) an increase in storage holdings of eggs in 1939 compared with the very low stocks of 1938, as a result of the larger supplies of eggs and the anticipated favorable outcome of the current storage deal; (5) increases in consumers' incomes to at least partly offset the unfavorable price effects of larger supplies of both poultry and eggs.
