Ill At Home

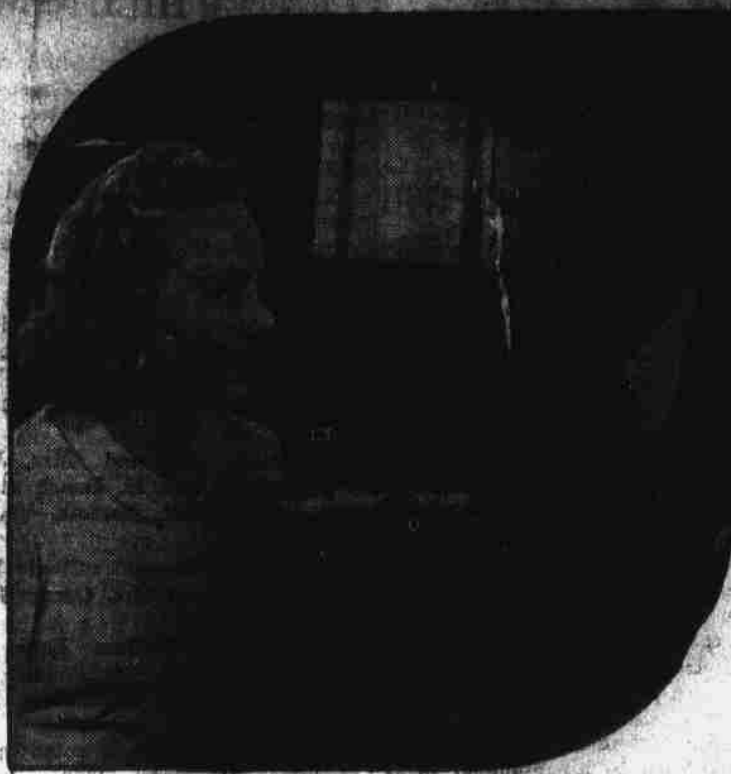
Leigh Winslow has been confined to his home because of illness. Mrs. Winslow has been quite ill but is reported to be much improved.

Crop And Seed Loan Applications Now Being Received

Help Offered to Farmers Whose Cash Requirements Are Small Agent's Office Headquarters

Emergency crop and seed loans for 1940 are now available to farmers in Perquimans County, and applications for these loans are now being received at the County Agent's office in Hertford by E. F. Morgan, Field Supervisor of the Emergency Crop and Seed Loan Section of the Farm Credit Administration.

These loans will be made, as in the past, only to farmers whose cash requirements are small and who cannot obtain a loan from any other source, including production credit associations, banks, or other private concerns or individuals.

As in former years, the money loaned will be limited to the applicant's necessary cash needs in preparing and cultivating his 1940 crops or in purchasing or producing feed for his livestock.

Borrowers who obtain loans for the production of cash crops are required to give as security a first lien on the crop financed or, in the case of loans for the purchase or production of feed for livestock, a first lien on the livestock to be fed.

Orders Totaling 896 Tons Of Agricultural Lime On Way Here

Orders amounting to 896 tons of agricultural ground limestone at \$2.65 a ton (a service of the Triple A) have been filed with Willie Jessup in the County Agent's office.

Units toward meeting the soil-building goal are given with the agricultural limestone... one unit for each 1,500 pounds of the lime used, according to Mr. Jessup. Two carloads, amounting to 112 tons have already been unloaded and distributed at Chapanoke, another car is on the siding here in Hertford, and eight of the sixteen cars mentioned in the 896 tons above are on the way to Perquimans County railroad stations now. Orders are consigned to the nearest railroad station... the subscriber takes it to his farm from there.

Senator Bailey Makes Statement Regarding Tobacco Situation

In a statement issued last week Senator Bailey pointed out to tobacco farmers the gravity of the tobacco situation caused by the British order to impose an embargo upon American tobacco.

In his statement Mr. Bailey said that he was by no means assured that there ever would be a complete recovery of the lost market and that he thought farmers should be notified of this in order that they might make timely adjustments in their crops.

Senator Bailey, while not suggesting, pointed out in his statement that North Carolina is due to develop very considerably in the production of dairy products, poultry and poultry products, and live-stock and that there is some prospect that prices for all food products will be better as the war goes on, inasmuch as nations at war are inclined to buy food as one of the necessities of sustenance and defense.
