Civil Service Exams

The United States Civil Service Commission has announced open competitive examinations for the positions of radio inspector, \$2,600 a year, in the Federal Communications Commission, and assistant radio inspector, \$2,000 a year, in various Government departments. Applications must be on file in the Commission's office at Washington, D. C., not later than March 4 if received from states east of Colorado, and not later than March 7, 1940, if received from Colorado and states westward. Except for the substitution of certain experience for education, applicants must have completed a 4-year college course in electrical or communications engineering. Certain experience is also necessary for the inspector grade. Applicants must not have passed their forty-fifth birthday.
