

## Easter Seal Sale Cleared \$54.34

Half of Amount Will Be Retained For Use at Home; Response Was Very Good

The Easter Seal Sale for Crippled Children has netted the central fund \$27.17 and the local fund a like amount, according to Miss Ruth Dav- enport, chairman of the Perquimans County Seal Sale which closed last Saturday.

Representing a total of \$54.34, the drive this year has resulted in a sum for the benefit of crippled children of something like \$21 more than last year.

The money to the central fund will be used for the maintenance of clinics, for the services of skilled physicians and nurses and for treatment.

The amount retained at home will be directed to bearing transportation costs to and from clinics, for the purchase of crutches, special shoes and braces.

"Almost every merchant in town bought seals," said Miss Dav- enport, "and the Society for Crippled Chil- dren is deeply grateful for the re- sponse, and for the aid of the school children who helped to sell them."

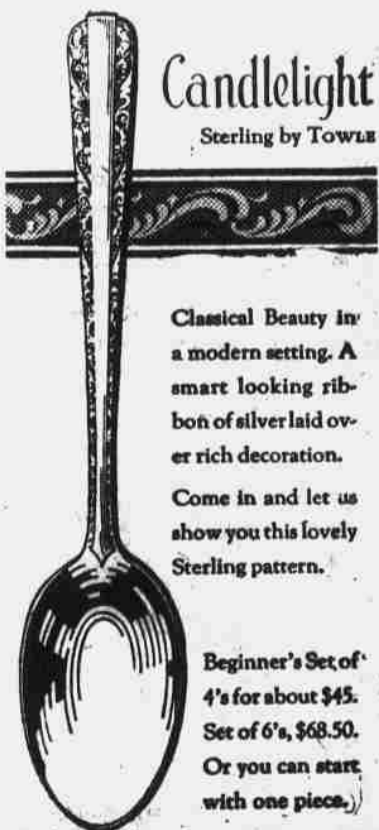

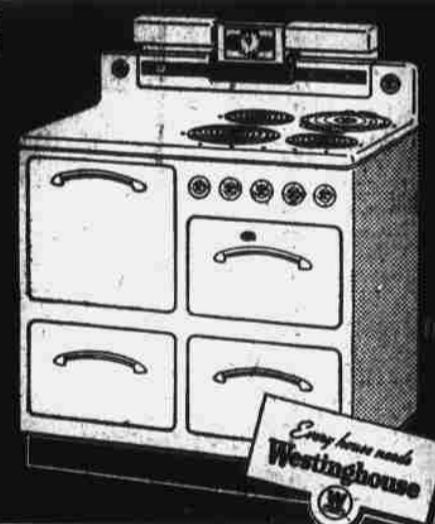
