Map Tracings Ready For Distribution To Perquimans Farmers

Map-tracings for convenience in planning the crops have been received in the office of L. W. Anderson, county agent, for Bethel, Belvidere, Hertford and New Hope. Tracings of farms in Parkville will be ready in a few days.

Several hundreds of the tracings, made of individual farms from aerial maps, have already been distributed, but many more are still on hand.

County farmers are urged to get their maps before they plant. They show individual plots and cuts on all individual farms, and should be of great help in planning the crops for the different cuts.

April Snow And Sleet Hit Crops In County

Temperatures high in the seventies following hard on the heels of snow and sleet last Friday night reveal that some crop damage was suffered from the storm in Belvidere and other townships.

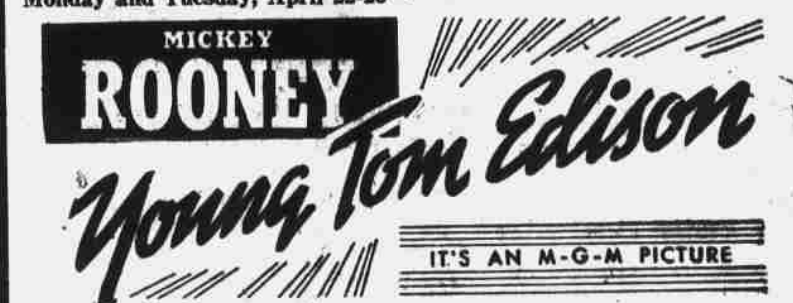
