Adequate primary markets for diversified farm and animal products.
Expanded inspection and grading service, with State assistance in advertising and marketing standardized products of peculiar merit.
An all-weather road from farm homes to markets and recreation centers.
More attention to conservation of soil and development of forest lands.

. . . The Highways

Main highways widened and straightened. Hard surfaced roads into neglected communities.
Farm-to-market roads, school bus routes and rural mail routes made useable every day in the year.
No increase in levies for highway revenue, but by spending what comes in instead of continuing allocations for a needless sinking fund, there will be more than fifty million dollars available for new roads in the next four years.

More vocational training in public schools for the benefit of the 97 per cent of pupils who do not get to college.
