swift final assault. So much hangs in the balance. It is useless to make predictions. Trained correspondents gave it up weeks ago.

On the home front Wednesday the defense program gained momentum while trouble brewed in South America where twelve Germans were arrested and an alleged Nazi plot was said to have been uncovered. A United States ship was ordered to Uruguay apparently in connection with the trouble to the south of us.

And on the closer home front, in Hertford, volumes of German propaganda, purporting to be "Polish Acts of Atrocity Against the German Minority in Poland," continue to travel unhampered through the United States mail.

Prepared and distributed by the German Library of Information in New York, the 269-page publication is obviously designed at this particular time to stir American sympathies in alleged outrages against Germany.
