MORE ABOUT TAXES

(Continued from Page One) they will cost 11 or 12 cents or two for 23 cents. One of Hertford's leading smoke shops is planning to discontinue the 10-cent brands entirely.

So much for cigarettes and now for the beer.

One of Hertford's two beer dealers said Monday that he expects to discontinue sales of 10-cent beer unless the distributors absorb the tax, and there is no indication that they will. Again the small margin of profit is to blame, and local dealers have no desire to sell 11-cent beer. Fifteen-cent beer will remain the same for the present at least at no added cost to the consumer.

Theatre tickets, apparently the source hardest hit, went up in price with the first curtain Monday afternoon to the tune of three cents per ticket. Ten-cent tickets, children's admission are not affected, but the three-cent charge is demanded on all free passes payable at the ticket window.

Manager E. L. Gibbs for the State

Theatre, and the owners and proprietors of the several business houses affected, are sorry they could not before the new tax went into effect, but the revenue measures were passed so quickly they were not prepared for the change themselves.

Gasoline prices surged upward Monday—half a cent tax on the gallon—and the tax demand goes on down the line to the consumer. The distributors are not absorbing it.

Though there is no liquor store in Perquimans County, there never has been a serious shortage of liquor here, so it is well to notify those who patronize the stores in Edenton and Elizabeth City that a 10-cent increase on liquors went into effect Monday at all ABC stores. The stores in Pasquotank and Chowan were jammed Saturday as hundreds of persons sought to replenish their stocks before the tax went into effect.

Many merchants who saw the symptoms and hoarded up supplies of cigarettes in anticipation of the increase gained exactly nothing by

doing so. Congress levied the tax so that they would have to pay for the cigarettes then in stock.

The Treasury expects to collect \$4,800,000 from the floor tax on cigarettes and \$19,600,000 from that on liquor and beer.

To some consumers, the new levies mean "doing without"; to others they are simply a nuisance, but to the befuddled dealers and distributors, who don't know exactly "what is what" the whole thing is one big nightmare.
