Cotton Improvement Groups Take Notice; Information From CCC

According to the Commodity Credit Corporation, the Form 1 Cotton Classification Memorandum will be accepted as evidence of the class of cotton for the 1940 loan (the Form 1 memorandum is the green card received by growers showing the classification of their individual bales).

In order to identify the bales, the gin or warehouse bale number must be entered on Form 1 card in the proper place before the sample is submitted for classification.

In accordance with the Commodity Credit Corporation's instructions to warehousemen, if members of groups have Form 1 classification memoranda, it will not be necessary to have the approved warehouseman resample their cotton or to pay the charge of 15 cents per bale for classification.

The warehouseman will see that the classification as shown on the Form 1 memorandum is copied into the schedule of warehouse receipts as provided in the Commodity Credit Corporation instructions to warehouses. The Form 1 Memoranda will be retained by the warehouseman.

The information given here is called to the special attention of all group members, and is released by Joe H. McClure, in charge, of the Atlanta Office of the Division of Cotton Marketing, United States Department of Agriculture.

Negroes Guilty Minor Charges; Knife User Under Bond Of \$500

Charged with cursing and fighting, Bernice Woodard and Bill Wiggins, Negroes, halved the charges; one pleading guilty to cursing and the other pleading guilty to fighting.

Eula Simons, Negro, who recently opened up a "country club kind of place out on the Belvidere highway," preferred the charges and was the State's principal witness. Simons wanted to keep his place clean and knew that road-house fighting would give the establishment a bad name.

Recorder McNider, presiding over County Court Tuesday, ordered judgment suspended upon payment of the costs.

Wiggins, asked if the cursing by Woodard made him mad, replied to Solicitor Charles E. Johnson, "No, Sir, I've been cussed many times. I didn't pay it any mind."

Madison Boone, Negro, capiased for back court costs, was granted 30 days in which to clear up his account.

The court ordered that Andrew Jones, Negro, in jail following a cutting frolic in Goose Hollow Saturday in which Eula Simons (Negro) was seriously injured, be retained unless a \$500 bond is posted pending the outcome of the Thatch woman's injuries.

AN ORDINANCE AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF \$2,000.00 BONDS OF THE TOWN OF HERTFORD, NORTH CAROLINA, FOR FIRE EQUIPMENT BE IT ORDAINED by the Board of Commissioners of the Town of Hertford as follows:

Section 1. Pursuant to the Municipal Finance Act, 1921, of North Carolina, as amended, negotiable bonds of the Town of Hertford, North Carolina, are hereby authorized to be issued in an aggregate amount not exceeding \$2,000 for the purpose of purchasing fire fighting equipment.

Section 2. A tax sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on said bonds shall be annually levied and collected.

Section 3. A statement of debt of the Town of Hertford has been filed with the Town Clerk and is open to public inspection.

Section 4. This ordinance shall take effect thirty (30) days after its first publication unless in the meantime a petition for its submission to the voters is filed under the Municipal Finance Act, 1921, and in such event it shall take effect when approved by the voters at an election as provided in such act.

The foregoing ordinance was passed on the 3rd day of September, 1940, and was first published on the 6th day of September, 1940.

Any action or proceeding questioning the validity of said ordinance must be commenced within thirty (30) days after its first publication.
